It incorporates a variety of poems (*selected British and American poems*) from different genres and periods and intends to develop students' ability to critically appreciate (interpret and evaluate) the poetry while applying different critical approaches to the study of poetry. Further, the course intends to assist learners in producing and evaluating their creative and analytical writing.
